



## Lincoln J. Warner

August 6, 1921 - August 18, 2011

Lincoln Jacoby Warner of Rosemont, died peacefully August 18, 2011. He was born August 6, 1921 to Frederick and Linda Warner in Narberth. The second of five children he grew up in a lively household.

As a young man he enjoyed figuring out how things functioned and were constructed. He made his own go-carts and learned to develop film. Linc had an athletic build and participated in a variety of sports; family and lifelong friends frequently joined in camping trips. He hiked sections of the Appalachian trail and climbed the highest peaks in the New England states. After graduation from Lower Merion High School he joined good friends on a summer bicycle tour of Europe returning as World War II commenced. During his service in the army he taught photography and was stationed in the Phillipines and Japan.

In 1946 he received his degree in architecture from the University of Pennsylvania. Subsequently Linc was employed by several firms in Philadelphia including Carroll Grisdale Van Alan and Vincent Kling Assoc. where he became involved in projects for the Philadelphia Airport, the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and Lankenau Hospital. He later became the architect for the Warner Co., a family building concern founded by his father. It included brothers Fred, Carden, and particularly Robert. His designs for colonial style houses were characterized by generous proportions and fine

details.

Linc married Mary Collins Carter in 1953. They enjoyed 56 years together and raised two children. A dry wit punctuated their home life. He looked forward to a round of golf with his son, was a happy gardener, derived great joy from music, had a telescope ready to study the evening sky and a camera at hand to record any family activity.

His son Lincoln J. Warner, Jr. and his wife preceded him in death. He is survived by his daughter Anne, a daughter in law Mary Jo and an extended family of nieces and nephews. A service is planned for a later date.
